South Houston Concerned Citizens' Coalition**October 15, 2015****Minutes**

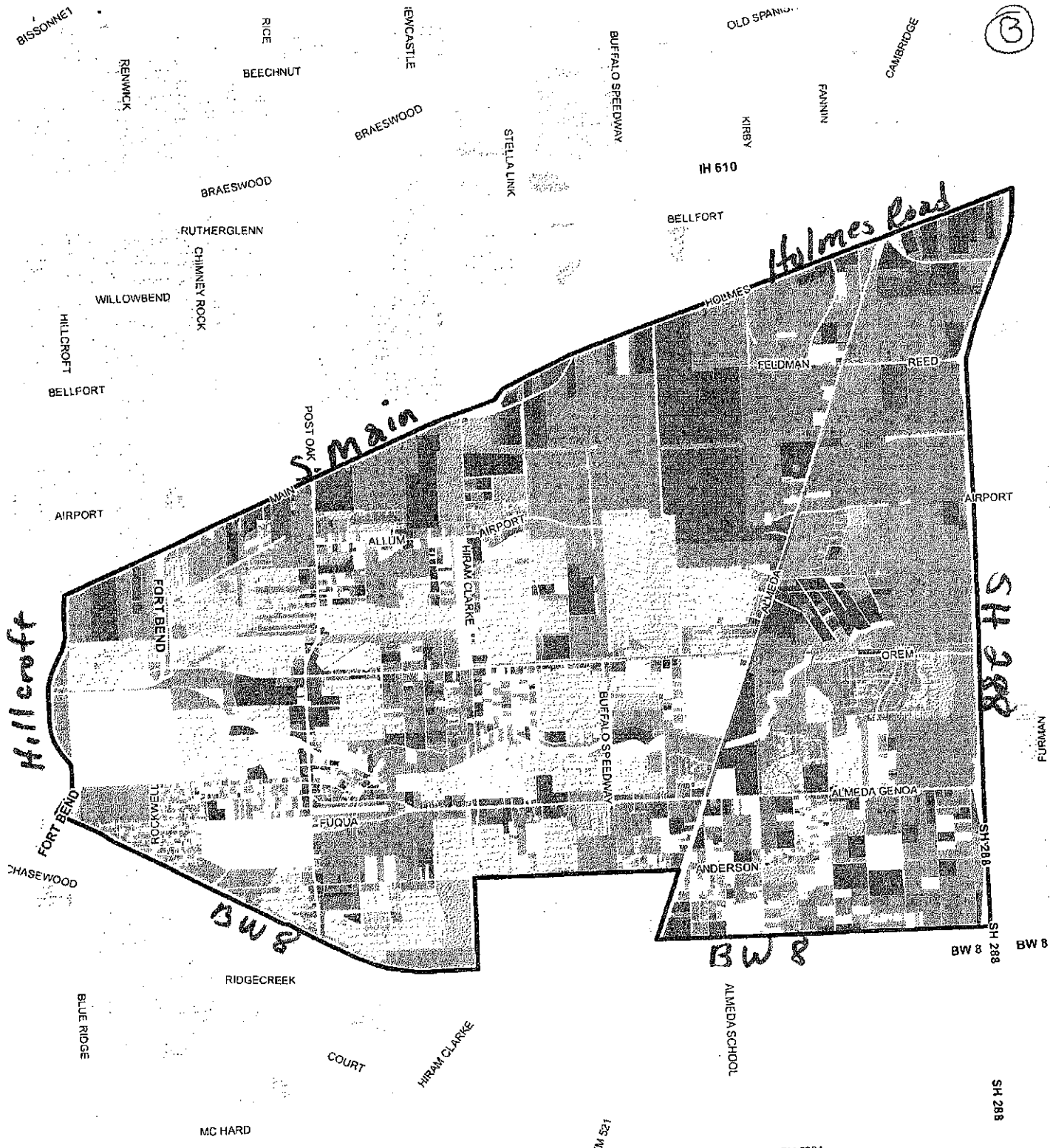
The meeting was called to order by Linda Scurlock, president. Mrs. Deauvearo offered the prayer followed by civic club/homeowners association self-introductions.

President Scurlock introduced the speaker, District K Council Member Larry Green. Council Member Green gave a list of his accomplishments over the last four years. His accomplishments included:

- Creation of the Hiram Clarke-Fort Bend Houston Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) 25
- Initiation of the expansion of TIRZ 9 to include Brentwood to Almeda and all of Hiram Clarke
- Clean It Up, Green It Up Initiative which included tree planting, wildflower planting, coordination with Bayou Greenway Hike and Bike trails along Sims Bayou (groundbreaking to be announced), mini-murals on traffic control boxes
- Creation of Bridging the Divide
- Delivery of backpacks to area elementary schools
- Demolition of six dilapidated houses
- Provision for transportation services to seniors
- Donation of tickets to seniors to Universoul Circus
- Donation of turkeys to seniors for Christmas
- Initiation/advocacy for the center barriers and street lights along S. Main
- Extension of Buffalo Speedway to Holmes Road
- Holmes Road reconstruction (to begin in 2016)
- Water main replacement for Brentwood, Pamela Heights, Ramblewood Park, and Townwood
- Street lights requests
- Upgrades to signal lights at Hiram Clarke and W. Airport (arms instead of hanging) in 2016
- Signal light at San Pablo Gardens Drive (2016)
- Upgrade of Wildheather Park (\$1.2 million) to begin December 2015
- Houston Police Department Southwest Substation (groundbreaking December 2015 with construction to begin January 2016)
- Participation on the Dowling Middle and Madison High Project Advisory Teams

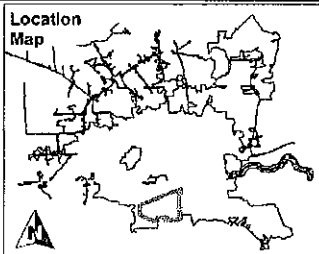
After the council member entertained questions from the attendees, the meeting adjourned.

meetings, and civic club/homeowners association meetings.

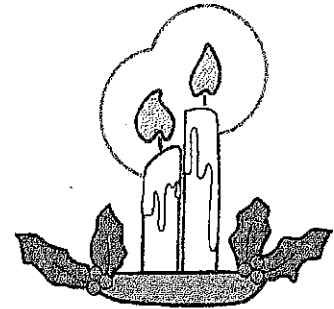

Identify theft is rampant. However, there are ways to help reduce your risk:

- Lock your financial documents and records in a safe place at your home, lock your wallet or purse in a safe place at work, and keep your information secure from roommates or workers who come into your home.
- Limit what you carry; take only the identification, credit cards, and debit cards you need. Do not carry your social security

Do You Know Your Rights?

Card in your wallet, and make a copy of your Medicare card to carry and black out all but the last four digits. Only carry the original with you when you go to the doctor's office.

- Do not share information at your workplace, a business, your child's school, or doctor's office until you know how it will be used and why it is needed.
- Shred receipts, credit offers, credit applica-

tions, insurance forms, physicians statements, checks, bank statements, expired charge cards, and similar documents when you don't need them any longer.

- Destroy the labels on prescription bottles before you throw them out. Do not share your health plan information with anyone who offers free health service products.
